

The Smyrna School District maintains a fiscally conservative policy. District budgetary estimates and financial projections are based on a moderately conservative approach to funds projections with a balanced budget each fiscal year funded exclusively from current-year revenues. These policies afford the Smyrna School District the ability to remain consistent, stable, and financially secure in the short term and well into the future.

For over 30 years, the district has had a citizen's financial advisory committee to provide community expertise and feedback to the district. The committee provides a layer of transparency to district finances and reviews major financial matters such as the operating budget and tax rates.

The Office of Curriculum and Instruction (OCI) works with all educators and administrators within the Smyrna School District to improve the educational experience of all our students. OCI is responsible for the adoption and implementation of all curriculum throughout the district and ensuring that daily instruction reflects research-based best practices. In order to best serve Smyrna's students and teachers, the team must be fully-informed and up-to-date with current classroom practices. To accomplish this, the team schedules regular visits to district classrooms, which inform professional development decisions that are targeted to each building, grade level, and teacher. OCI conducts more than 60 unique opportunities for professional learning yearly; totaling over 200 hours of training, in addition to site-based coaching visits to individual schools and classrooms. While professional development is very unique and targeted to the needs of the teacher, many of the sessions have addressed the implementation of newly-adopted high-quality instructional materials in both English Language Arts and Mathematics.

The Smyrna Special Services Team engages in collaboration and problem-solving with staff, students, and families, to develop meaningful, comprehensive plans to support students' success.

The Special Services Office facilitates services for students in accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act (IDEIA), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, and the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act. Approximately 60 staff members support students and their families and assist with school teams' data review to develop meaningful, individualized plans that support students' overall success.

The Special Services Office monitors students' progress to ensure that they receive appropriate accommodations and specialized instruction within the least restrictive environment. Our team also provides direct services to students to support their developmental and social-emotional needs (e.g., individual and group counseling, social skills development, mentoring, physical speech-language, and/or occupational therapies, behavior support, and transition services).





Technology Highlights for the SY 2021-2022

- First full year of student One-to-One initiative. Each student was provided a Chromebook for both at-home and classroom use.
- Implemented a digital content filtering solution called GoGuardian. This service helps protect students against harmful and inappropriate material while browsing the internet.
- Year one of the teacher One-to-One initiative was implemented. All teachers received a laptop to increase instructional mobility and flexibility.
- Our district website underwent re-branding and renovation to improve ease of use and appearance.
- Updated the network infrastructure by replacing all network switches at all schools. This increased network speeds and allows the Technology department to proactively troubleshoot network irregularities.
- The wireless management administrative console was migrated to the cloud. This provided greater flexibility in the configuration of wireless network policies.

Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program (FFVP) is a USDA-funded grant for North Smyrna Elementary. The grant allows Child Nutrition Staff to provide fresh fruits and vegetables to students three days per week. The Child Nutrition Program received \$31,125.00 for SY 2021/2022.

The Child Nutrition Program was granted a waiver for SY 2021/2022 due to the pandemic to serve meals to students under the Seamless Summer Option (SSO). This Program is a USDA-based program that allowed us to serve meals at no cost. Under SSO, we were able to serve students meals who were still attending school virtually as well as open an SSO site for the Early Childhood Assistance Program (ECAP) at the Boys and Girls Club of Smyrna. We served ECAP students breakfast and snack meals daily. In addition, at each school, we were able to serve meals under the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) for students staying after school each day.

In the summer of 2022, the Child Nutrition Program provided breakfast and lunch meals to students attending Summer Academy, the 12-Month Program, and Summer Camp. Classes were held at Smyrna Middle School from July 6, 2022, through August 9, 2022. We also provided free meal service via the Child Nutrition Bus and were serving meals daily outside of JBM Intermediate and Commerce Square, 101 Talon Court in Smyrna.

2022/2023 Highlights

- Ensured safe and clean schools for students and faculty by working closely with building administration.
- Updated old, dilapidated John Bassett Moore Intermediate tennis courts into two new basketball courts with the new playing surfaces and concrete walkways to and from the school.
- Completed site work and installation of an inclusive playground for our students and updated the main playground with some new equipment at Smyrna Elementary.
- Constructed two new outdoor classrooms at John Bassett Moore Intermediate and Smyrna Elementary.
- Added new personnel to our existing team in an effort to keep up with growing school populations and needs and keep all schools clean and looking their best.
- Installed new LED lights in all of our gymnasiums and nearly all of our exteriors to help reduce overall energy consumption and worked with other local agencies to utilize their rebate programs. Thus far this year, we have received approximately \$12,000 in rebates.
- Monthly preventive maintenance and safety checks are conducted on district fleet vehicles, backup generators, and eye washing stations, ensuring all are safe for operation for students and staff.
- The district continues to utilize an electronic work order system to make sure issues are handled in a timely and efficient manner. Building requests range from maintaining appropriate temperatures in buildings to fixing doors or locks and keeping the lawns cut and parking lots clear and safe. On average, the team clears over 120 tickets monthly.

We continue to prioritize social-emotional learning as well as restorative and trauma-informed practices within our schools to offer a whole-child learning approach to every student. Safety Specialists provide consistent monitoring, training, and support to all of our schools by building relationships with staff and students, completing regular safety assessments, and updating requirements as needed. Some of the training our department provides include ALICE (active shooter response), First Aid/CPR, Stop the Bleed, De-escalation, Restorative Practices, annual safety training, and Trauma-Informed classrooms. The Department continues to lead the District's Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging Committee. This committee works to achieve its goal of providing a diverse and equitable environment so all who enter our schools feel a sense of safety and belonging. The District's Code of Conduct was updated with the help of staff from across the District that offers progressive discipline with the goal to build healthy communities, increase social learning, decreasing anti-social behavior, repairing harm, and restoring relationships. The department planned and successfully held the District's second Fall Fest in October 2022, bringing the community together for family fun and connection. We continuously uphold our safety standards while creating innovative ways to keep all who enter our buildings safe and supported.

Develop successful students as future productive citizens by providing academic and extra-curricular opportunities in an inclusive environment.

Through collaboration between families and SMS staff, students will: be provided with equitable opportunities that are academically challenging, commit to excellence and perseverance, have a safe learning environment, develop positive interpersonal skills, and maintain success, productivity and purpose through their middle school experience.

Smyrna Middle School serves 1,043 seventh and eighth-grade students in the Smyrna School District. Students are on a ninety-minute block schedule having eight different classes. Students are on one of four teams which determines their primary hall for core classes and team activities. These teams participate in weekly SEL activities throughout the school year. Students have the opportunity to take not only their core courses but PE, Health, Home Ec, Inclusion in our Community, Band, Chorus, Ag Science, STEM, Creative Writing, Art, Spanish, Sign Language, Brain Games, Computer Tech, Public Speaking, Geography, Sports History, Family Consumer Science, Yearbook and Wellness.

Smyrna Middle school offers a wide variety of extra-curricular opportunities for students including twelve clubs and/or honor societies and twelve competitive athletic programs covering all three seasons.

Our academic programs ask students to challenge their thinking and analyze materials as they learn. Using Restorative Practices and considering Trauma Informed Care, we are working as a staff to promote wellness among our students. We have weekly SEL lessons for all students and homework help hours. We also provide students with opportunities to seek the support of our counselors to advocate for themselves in their learning. It is our goal to provide a safe learning environment where students can achieve academic success.

Vision

To provide our students with the skills needed to reach their full potential in a competitive and ever-changing world.

Mission

Smyrna High School is devoted to providing a safe and student-centered school family by creating opportunities for all students to be Champions within the classroom, campus, and community by making connections and building dreams for all students.

The Smyrna High School motto is "Making Connections & Building Dreams." It is the goal of our staff to provide an educational environment that enables all of our 1800+ students to connect the content of their classes and involvement in school activities to their personal dreams for the future. We provide many different educational settings for our students, including Dual Enrollment, Advanced Placement, Honors, College Preparatory, Team-taught classes, and small-group settings. These settings enable us to meet the needs of a variety of learners with many different levels of support. Some highlights from the past year are:

- SHS offered 17 Advanced Placement courses in the 2021-2022 school year. In May 2022, 176 students took a total of 305 exams, and 47% passed with a score of 3 or better. Eighteen students were recognized as AP Scholars. Of those students, 5 earned the distinction of AP Scholar with Honor (receiving an average score of at least 3.25 on exams taken & scores of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams), and 6 were recognized as an AP Scholar with Distinction (receiving an average score of at least 3.5 on all exams taken & scores of 3 or higher on 5 or more of these exams).
- SHS has continued its partnerships with Delaware State University, Delaware Technical Community College, University of Delaware, and Wilmington University to offer 17 dual enrollment courses, taught by SHS faculty on our campus or by University of Delaware faculty in an asynchronous format. These opportunities to earn both high school and college credit are offered at no cost to students.
- We continue to expand and update our existing Career & Technical Education (CTE) programs. Our CTE pathways offer students the opportunity to earn articulated credits at local universities through completion of the pathway courses, in addition to the dual enrollment opportunities in the K-12 Teacher Academy, Early Childhood Education Teacher Academy, and Allied Health pathways. During the 2022-2023 school year, we added a dual enrollment course in our Business, Finance, and Marketing Department for students enrolled in any of the business pathways. We continue to add dual enrollment opportunities for our students completing CTE pathways, including the addition of a second dual enrollment course available to business pathway students for the 2023-2024 school year.

Smyrna High - Career Pathways

Pathways

All Delaware high school students are required to complete a "career pathway" to graduate. A career pathway means three credits of sequential courses designed to develop knowledge and skills in a particular career area. Smyrna High School offers over 20 different career pathway options that are divided into 7 schools of study (or areas of study).
